Apply for a low-interest loan from the Mathews Memorial Fund

Following his death in 1970, the J. Howard Mathews Memorial Fund was established to honor founder "Matty" Mathews. The fund, held and administered by the Alpha Chi Sigma Educational Foundation, provides low-interest loans to collegiate members of Alpha Chi Sigma, who become eligible to participate in the program on the first anniversary of their initiation. Read about just a few of your Brothers who have benefited from a Mathews loan.

"The Matthews Loan was one of three loans I tapped into for my senior year of college expenses as well as monies earned from my last term as a co-op student. Since that loan went directly to me and not directly to the school, that loan helped me to afford taking a week off from work in the summer of 1992 to attend my first Conclave - it more than covered for the loss of a week's pay, plus the cost of registration, travel and room & board. Thinking back upon it, the Mathews Loan was key to my continued fraternal involvement. If I hadn't attended that Conclave, then I probably wouldn't have gotten around to attending any future Conclaves and I know attending several Conclaves (and at my own expense each time for the first 18 years) consecutively caught the attention of several national leaders who decided to but me to work on various committees and nominate me (or propose to nominate me) for several rounds of PR elections and a few SC elections." "I asked for a Mathew's Loan my last year enrolled at Beta Sigma. At the time, it was useful to me to pay for GRE testing and application fees to graduate schools. Who knows? 
"The Mathews loan was suggested to me by my Chapter Advisor in my senior year of school. I applied for it with his help

I think that was my best semester overall GPA wise and the least stressful semester I had. I paid for all of my school as I went to school and I attended full time. I worked a lot during my undergraduate degree and it was stressful to make sure I worked enough to pay the bills but also to have enough free time to do my homework and keep up on my studies. This was a very helpful loan to have, and to be able to pay it back over time was so helpful to ensure that others could use it if needed. I really appreciated it during that semester of school." 2015 Professional Fraternity Association's Leadership Academy

Students! Interested in leadership training?

This May, The <u>Professional Fraternity Association (PFA)</u> will host its inaugural Leadership Academy at the Hilton Atlanta Airport. PFA represents over 100,000 undergraduate and graduate students on over 1,000 campuses across the nation, in professional fields such as agriculture, business, engineering, law, medicine, music, nursing, pharmacy, and more.



Alpha Chi Sigma wants as many collegiate members to attend as possible, so the Foundation is generously offering to reimburse \$100 per person to offset some of the registration fee! This will be limited to 30 people, up to 6 people per chapter, until May 1. After the deadline, any monies remaining are unlimited to chapters. Collegiate members will need to register themselves, and then contact the National Office for your reimbursement.

The 2015 Leadership Academy will be held May 29-31 at the rate of \$91/night. Reservations can be made with Hilton (I-800-445-8667 – Group Code: PFA or online here). Registration is \$149 per person, and includes two lunches, LPI Co-Curricula educational materials, student self workbook, facilitation leadership by PFA member groups, and the opportunity to meet and learn from your peers in other fraternal groups! Curricula is based on the Kouzes-Posner Leadership Challenge. Universities often have funds available for students to attend leadership programs so check with your university when you register.

Don't lose your tax-exempt status

Collegiate and Professional Chapters whose gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less are required to annually file an electronic Form 990-N, or e-postcard, with the IRS.

The form is easy to complete. All you need is the following information about your organization:

- Employer identification number (EIN) provided by the National Office
- Tax year
- · Legal name and mailing address
- Any other names the organization uses
- Name and address of a principal officer (Chapter Advisor)
- Website address, if applicable
- Confirmation that the organization's annual gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less

The e-postcard is due each year by May 15th. Don't put Alpha Chi Sigma or your chapter's tax-exempt status in jeopardy! Each chapter will receive an email with instructions and reminders from the <u>National Office</u>.

My path to joining Alpha Chi Sigma was a rather circuitous one, but I am glad I was persuaded to make the journey.

When we said no, she asked if we were going to pledge. We talked about it for most of the week. After one of the classes, Stephanie persuaded us to go sign up for the pizza party that would occur Thursday night (by persuaded, I mean marched us down the hill, and into the Alpha Chi Sigma lounge). When I showed up for the pizza party, I found that I already knew some of the Brothers, as well as finding my friend, Len Russo, among those interested in pledging. Even though Nanci ended up depledging, I quickly grew to love the organization, and was certain that it would hold a permanent place in my life. My collegiate Brothers are still some of my closest friends. I attended Maryland football games with them, and have been blessed to attend their weddings, as well as have them in mine. My best friend, who I've known since we were 5, Christie (Franklin) Foulke, pledged the semester after me. She ended up marrying one of my pledge Brothers, Russell Foulke. Stephanie Lee also married a Brother, Dr. Joon You. And I did as well - Michael Webster.

As a collegiate, I held many offices — Historian, Master of Ceremonies, and Master Alchemist. I also had the good fortune of having a very active Professional Chapter nearby, Washington Pro. This Professional Chapter gave me direct insight into one of the ways I could be active with Alpha Chi Sigma after graduation. Alpha Rho also used to initiate members from two local chapters — Alpha Pi and Beta Upsilon, so I had some early exposure to interacting with those outside my "home chapter" as well. My greatest interest, though, came in the form of the District Counselor position. I loved the idea of being a professional member and being able to interact with all of the collegiate members. At the time, that was my main goal in Alpha Chi Sigma: to be a District Counselor.

Once I graduated, I became active with Washington Pro, helped form Chesapeake Bay Pro, and attended events with Delaware Valley Pro. I also served as Alumni Secretary for Alpha Rho Chapter. I then helped with the reactivation of Nu Chapter at Penn State, the reactivation of Alpha Pi Chapter at George Washington University, and the installation of Gamma Omicron Chapter at Lehigh University. Most of my activities stayed within my District. This all changed though, due to Abbey (House) DeGraffenreid. She persuaded a group of collegiates and professionals to take a 15-passenger van to the 2000 Biennial Conclave in St. Louis, Missouri. Attending Conclave gave me a whole new perspective on how my involvement with Alpha Chi Sigma could grow and help others. Prior to this Conclave, I had run for Professional Representative (PR) twice and lost. At the end of Conclave, I found out that I would be serving the rest of Pete Yochim's term, as he had been elected to Supreme Council. This would also happen one other year before 2005, when I was elected outright. I served as a PR from 2005 until 2008, when my fraternal dream came true! I was appointed as the Atlantic Central District Counselor at the conclusion of the 2008 Biennial Conclave, when Dr. Randy Weinstein was elected to Supreme Council.

I thoroughly enjoyed serving as District Counselor, and all of my interactions with both the collegiate members and professionals in my district taught me many things. One of the major lessons I learned was that no one Brother's path is the same; we all have different interests, and come to different conclusions different ways. As an organization, we need to look at not only how we support our Brothers, but how our Brothers would like to support Alpha Chi Sigma. You never know what someone may be good at, or what ideas are out there. It's always good to listen and ask.

I ended up serving as DC for four years. I was then elected to the Supreme Council in 2012 as the Grand Collegiate Alchemist. I was able to take what I had learned through my years of service in Alpha Chi Sigma, and apply it in a whole new way. Every day is a learning experience, and a way in which I can draw joy from my service to our organization.

Alpha Rho, 1994 - Grand Collegiate Alchemist


I enjoy working with our collegiate members and seeing how they grow.

Helpful tips on submitting a Conclave bid

Submit your Conclave bid by April 30.

- I.To start focus on location and costs of the banquet, initiation, meals (including alternative dining option), and lodging. Be aware and report any hidden costs (room rental fees, AV equipment, decorations).
- 2. We had the issue that the cafeteria wasn't going to be open for all of the meals so we included bids of an alternative option (including silverware and delivery fees).
- 3. For the major events it helps to think about as many details ahead of time as possible and include them in the bid. For example room rental fees and decoration costs for the banquet or how are you going to purchase items for the snacks.
- 4. In our bid we also included a support letter from the chapter, alumni, and the chemistry department showing that we had the support and help that we needed to actually run Conclave (this was especially helpful since we ran conclave with ~20 active brothers and relied on alumni support as well).
- 5. If possible, take advantage of connections that you have already established. For example, having our chemistry department rent the rooms and banquet location cut down on our costs significantly.
- 6. Take the extra time to include every detail that you have worked out into the bid. Having pictures, maps, and/or tables will make the bid look nicer but also make it easier to understand.

Grand Professional Alchemist Dr. Jonathan E. Wenzel to speak at the Annual Krug Lecture

The annual Krug Lecture is excited to announce that Jonathan Wenzel, the Grand Professional Alchemist of Alpha Chi Sigma, will be this year's lecturer. The event will be hosted by the Zeta chapter – University of Illinois on Sunday, April 26. The chapter is enthusiastic about his visit to campus and his speech about his research in extracts from agricultural by-products and evaluating conditions of supercritical fluid extraction.

The Krug Lecture was established by Louis G. Krug, a member of the Zeta chapter, with the purpose of bringing faculty, graduate students, and undergraduate students together to share the knowledge of chemistry. Each year, the Zeta chapter invites a professor within the discipline to celebrate and recognize their achievements, as well as educate and enlighten the attendees of their current research. Previous speakers include Nobel Prize winners Paul Flory, Melvin Calvin, Herbert C. Brown, E.J. Corey, Rudy Marcus, Tom Cech, and Dick Schrock.

Louis G. Krug initiated with the Zeta Chapter on January 16, 1915, and was highly invested in Alpha Chi Sigma as a member before he passed away in 1972. Through his life, he worked for the William Wrigley Company of Chicago and the Rawhide Manufacturing Company. Brother Krug set up a substantial bequest to the Zeta Chapter in order to host a lecture annually in his honor.

Call for Academic Poster Presentations

The Western Coatings Symposium (WCS) is seeking academic poster presentations to be considered for the 32nd Biennial WCS. Sponsored by the Arizona, Golden Gate, Pacific Northwest and Los Angeles Societies for Coatings Technology, the 32nd WCS will be held at the Paris Hotel, Las Vegas, NV, on October 25-28, 2015.

WCS Academic Poster Presentations Requirements

The WCS Academic Poster Session is designed to encourage university students to submit posters promoting new ideas and technologies based on preliminary or completed coatings or related materials research. All students presenting an accepted poster will receive \$200.00 and are eligible for the three Academic Poster Session monetary awards. In addition to the three monetary awards, there are four speaker slots reserved for four students to present their findings to the attendees of the WCS Symposium. Each accepted academic poster will be provided with a display board to highlight the research project. Students will be required to be present in the exhibit hall during WCS exhibit hours for the purpose of discussing their projects with WCS attendees. Only one poster can be submitted by a given student with a maximum of two students per poster. A University can elect to set up an accepted academic poster without a student, but the University will not receive the \$200 accepted poster prize or be eligible for the three academic poster competition awards.

Awards for the WCS Academic Poster Competition Session are:

Ist Prize = \$1,200.00 2nd Prize = \$600.00 3rd Prize = \$300.00

To participate, submit a 100-200 word Academic Poster Abstract by April 17, 2015, including title of paper, University name, author name(s), and contact information. Students will be notified of acceptance by May 22, 2015. Following acceptance, submissions must be completed by August 31, 2015.
