Alpha Kappa Chapter was founded on May 27, 1922, at the University of Virginia. The chapter house is located at 1713 Jefferson Park Ave., and as of spring 2013, the chapter is 21 members strong, Alpha Kappa Chapter is involved in many outreach opportunities, including teaching merit badges, assisting at elementary school fairs and most notably the annual CHEMFEST, where children from local schools participate in an interactive day of fun, chemistry-rich activities and "magic shows."

The University of Virginia (UVA) was founded in 1819 by former President Thomas Jefferson. Locally, the UVA campus is referred to as the "Grounds." The UVA

campus is the only university campus in the United States that is designated as a world heritage site by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The grounds of the university are full of rich, beautiful architecture that make living in the city of Charlottesville all the more enjoyable. Of the many impressive pieces of architecture designed by Jefferson, the Rotunda was created as the heart of his community of scholars. The original buildings make up what Jefferson intended to be an "Academical Village."

Among the many successful alumni of the university, the most famous is the renowned poet Edgar Allan Poe, who



did not actually graduate from the university. Other notable UVA alumni include Tina Fey, the popular actress who starred for many years on "Saturday Night Live" and "30 Rock," and Richard Byrd, a prominent Polar explorer. John Backus, founder of the first widely used high-level programming language FORTRAN, is also a graduate of the University of Virginia.

Alpha Kappa Chapter is very excited to welcome Brothers from across the country to our beautiful university.

Follow this checklist to report pledges and initiates

- Order Sourcebooks and pledge pins for the current pledge class.
- □ Report pledges to the National Office (including faculty and professional candidates and pledges who previously depledged) using the <u>pledge</u> report form.
- □ Review the pledge confirmation report sent from the National Office.

Confirm that all pledges' names are spelled correctly.

I Collect the \$40 pledge fee and the \$145 lifetime member fee before the initiation ceremony. Or ask pledges to pay the entire \$185 fee online.

Do not initiate pledges who do not pay the entire \$185 fee or the \$40 pledge fee and the first \$80 installment of

the lifetime member

fee. These fees must be paid at least two weeks before initiation. But the sooner the National Office receives these fees, the quicker we can send the badges to your chapter.

□ Within one week of initiation, send the confirmation report by e-mail or postal mail. Inidicate which pledges initiated and which did not. Mem-

ber certificates and cards for pledges who initiated will be sent to your chapter as soon as this report is submitted. Refunds of lifetime member fees for pledges who did not initiate also will be sent.

If your chapter has not received this check yet, it should arrive within the next week.

Please deposit your check before Oct. 31, 2013, or it will be voided.

Because this money was given as a contribution to a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization, it can only be used for charitable, educational or professional purposes

that support our tax exempt purposes.

You must keep adequate records that prove that these funds and any chapter dues collected from your members were not used for any other purpose.

If you collect money from your members for social purposes, these funds should be collected separately from chapter dues.

These funds should be accounted for separately and kept in a separate bank account if possible. Social funds can be spent on 501(c)(3) activities, but 501(c)(3) funds cannot be spent on social activities.

Of course, the Fraternity's Risk Management Policy prohibits the expenditure of



any chapter funds on alcoholic beverages.

You Might Be Hazing...

- If the word "kidnap" is mentioned, you might be hazing.
- If the phrase "find your way home" is used, you might be hazing.
- If you make someone drink too much of anything, you might be hazing.
- If you make someone eat too much of anything, you might be hazing.
- If a YouTube video of the activity would go viral, you might be hazing.
- If groveling is involved, you might be hazing.
- If alcohol is involved, you might be hazing.
- If it changes the pledges' physical appearance, you might be hazing.
- If you would not want it to happen to you, you might be hazing.



- If the mixture of foods you serve would not appear together in a restaurant, you might be hazing.
- If it involves a blindfold and is not initiation, you might be hazing.
- If pictures can't be posted on Facebook, you might be hazing.
- If it happened in a National Lampoon movie, you might be hazing.
- If underwear or less clothing is the attire, you might be hazing.
- If the idea came from a drinking session, you might be hazing.
- If your excuse is, "We're helping the pledges bond," you might be hazing.
- If you have to ask, you might be hazing.

All joking aside, the words "might be" should probably be replaced with "are" in these examples.

Stop Hazing defines hazing as any activity expected of someone joining a group (or to maintain full status in a group) that humiliates, degrades or risks emotional and/or physical harm, regardless of the person's willingness to participate.

If you have enough doubt to ask about a particular activity, it should be your first clue that it is probably hazing.


As of Oct. 1, no chapters have initiation paperwork and/or payments pending from previous semesters!
